The Guam Preservation Trust (GPT) hosted the inaugural Pacific Preservation Summit with the theme "Connect, Appreciate, Preserve" from February 26-28, 2018. This summit brought together preservation agencies, professionals, students, and the general public to Guam to share best practices and challenges dealing with preservation in their counties. The summit was funded by the Department

of the Interior Office of Insular Affairs in partnership with the Guam Museum, National Museum of the Dulce Nombre de Maria Cathedral-Basilica, Guam Council of Arts and Humanities, Guam Public Library System, the 34th Guam Legislature, the National Park Service and in tandem with preservation advocates in architecture, archaeology, culture, history, and planning to provide the venue for the summit.

During the three-day summit, the opportunity is given to develop collaborative resources to prepare our island adapt and mitigate against the threats towards tangible and intangible historic and cultural areas or properties our communities' value.

Participants from Yap State, Kosrae State, and Palau, CNMI, FSM, Hawaii, Fiji and Guam all took part in this summit to share their insights and efforts made towards preservation. Palau was represented by Director Sunny Ngirmang and Deputy HPO Calvin Emesiochel.

Cremation Ceremony of WWII Japanese Remains



On March 5, 2018, the Ministry of Community and Cultural Affairs and the Bureau of Cultural and Historical Preservation staff travelled to Peleliu State to attend the WWII Japanese Remains Cremation Ceremony. This is the great efforts the Japanese Government has invested to bring their loved ones home after 73 years. The efforts between the Palau Government and Japan Government dated back to 2009 to actively search, investigate, and recover World War Two soldiers who perished in our land during armed conflict. The Japanese war dead remains were cremated and brought back to Japan for their final resting place.

Ships of Exploration and Discovery Research, Inc. heads to Palau for WWII Research

Ships of Exploration and Discovery Research, Inc. (Ships of Discovery) researcher are headed to Peleliu to undertake a Phase I remote sensing survey of the WWII invasion beaches. The project is funded through a 2017 NOAA Ocean Exploration Research grant with additional support from an NPS American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP) grant.

This project will be the first comprehensive survey for underwater cultural heritage remains of the Peleliu invasion beaches, fringing reef, and lagoon. Integral to the project is an examination of the impacts of the preinvasion blasting of the reef by Underwater Demolition Teams (UDTs). The reef study will be the first of its kind to document the WWII impacts and to quantify the interactive role of the corals and WWII materiel on both resources. Photogrammetric documentation of underwater cultural heritage sites and the reef will result in 3D interactive models for in-depth analysis and that will be publically viewable through SketchFab.

This project is a cooperative effort between Ships of Discovery, East Carolina University (ECU) Maritime Studies Program, University of Hawi'i Hilo, SEARCH Inc, the US Navy Joint Region Marianas, and the Palau Bureau of Cultural and Historical Preservation. Fieldwork will begin on April 2 and run through April 12.

Previous research in the Pacific by Ships of Discovery and ECU includes several projects in Saipan and Tinian under the National Park Service American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP). Their work includes the creation of an underwater heritage maritime trail, consisting of twelve submerged and semi-submerged archaeological sites including four aircraft wrecks, two shipwrecks, three tanks, two landing craft and one Amtrak. Waterproof guides (in English and Japanese) including a site map and historical information, posters that included images of the wrecks and more in-depth information, and an 18-minute interpretive video created for the NPS are part of their Saipan work. On January 19, 2018, the Bureau of Cultural and Historical Preservation (BCHP) Staff, Ms. Filly Carabit, Historic Preservation Specialist presented to the 5th grade



students of Koror Elementary School. Ms. Carabit gave an overview of the work of the Bureau of Cultural and Historical Preservation and the importance of cultural and historical preservation.

This is part of the BCHP on-going effort to strengthen awareness and to educate the public about the importance of the Palauan cultures and historical treasures.

Historical Clearance Permitted

During the period of January - March 2018, the Bureau reviewed and concurred a total of ninety-three (93) Historical Clearance. Out of the 93, forty-six (46) were residential project, 15 were new commercial project, 7 were existing commercial project, 5 were state government projects, 2 were explosive remnants of war, 11 were CIP/Republic of Palau project, 1 was church project, and 6 were repatriation/section 106 project. These development projects included constructions of new access roads, improvement of existing access roads, building new residences, commercial projects, clearing projects, renovation of existing buildings, home extensions, earthmoving project, dredging projects, grading and leveling projects.

As mandated by law, the Bureau must review and determine the effects of any public and/or private development projects to insure historical and cultural resources are protected and preserved. Before any development project begins, a Historic Clearance Permit must be obtained from the Bureau of Cultural and Historical Preservation.
